#### **Honors**

ames A. Banks is the 2022 recipient of the Irving Morrissett
Award for Excellence in Social Science Education. Conferred at



SSEC's international conference in June, the Morrissett Award recognizes an individual who has devoted his/her career to improving social studies/social science education. Criteria for award selection include documented evidence of improving the field, significant scholarly publications, continuing commitment to the field, and continuing commitment to the Social Science Education Consortium.



Jim is the Kerry and Linda Killinger Endowed Chair in Diversity Studies Emeritus and is the founding director of the Center for Multicultural Education at the University of Washington, which is now the Banks Center for Educational Justice. He was the Russell F. Stark University Professor at the University of Washington from 2001 to 2006. Professor Banks is a past president of the American Educational Research Association and of the National

Council for the Social Studies. He is a specialist in social studies education, multicultural education, and diversity and citizenship education and has written widely in these fields.

Professor Banks is the editor of the Handbook of Research on Multicultural Education; The Routledge International Companion to Multicultural Education; Diversity and Citizenship Education: Global Perspectives; the Encyclopedia of Diversity in Education, and Citizenship Education and Global Migration: Implications for Theory, Research, and Teaching. He is also the editor of the Multicultural Education Series of books published by Teachers College Press, Columbia University. He is a member of the National Academy of Education and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Research by Professor Banks on how educational institutions can improve race

and ethnic relations has greatly influenced schools, colleges, and universities throughout the United States and the world. He is often called the "Father of Multicultural Education." Professor Banks has given lectures on citizenship education and diversity in many different nations. SSEC is proud to count Professor James Banks as a member.

In response to news of the award, Prof. Banks wrote the following:

I am delighted that SSEC has awarded me the 2022 Irving Morrissett Award for Excellence in Social Science Education. I am honored to receive the Award not only because it recognizes my work in social studies education and SSEC, but also because I was a friend and colleague of Irving Morrissett, who was executive director of SSEC when I was elected in the early 1970s. Please extend my warm thanks and gratitude to the Award Selection Committee and convey to them how sorry I am that I cannot be in Dublin to personally receive the Award. I have accepted an invitation to give a keynote address in Haifa, Israel in June and consequently will not be able to come to Dublin, a city that I greatly admire and in which I have given keynote addresses at colleges and universities on several occasions in past years, including a lecture at Dublin City University in 2007.





### **Information Age Publishing**



Again this year, IAP provided support for the annual conference and our Young Scholars. Our publisher arranged for an online bookstore, which included discounts for conference participants. With two years of Young Scholars, IAP provided two \$250 awards for the outstanding Young Scholar paper presentations by Scott Durham (2020) and Patrick Keegan (2022) and a selection of four books each for Scott, Patrick, and two runners-up: Lauren Bradshaw and Chenyu Li.

CivXNow and iCivics have worked diligently to support the bipartisan, bicameral *Civics Secures Democracy (CSD) Act.* SSEC is a signatory to the following letter to be sent to Congress asking that the Senate-revised bill be reintroduced to the House for approval. The letter reads:

Strong civic education is essential to the very future of our constitutional democracy. We strongly support the bipartisan, bicameral Civics Secures Democracy (CSD) Act and urge you to consider cosponsoring this generational investment in K–12 civic education and American history. CSD would afford the opportunity for each and every K–12 student in this country to have access to the kind of civic education needed to become informed stewards of U.S. constitutional democracy.

Unfortunately, civic education has been marginalized in our nation's schools, with just 5 cents of federal investment per K–12 student. By contrast, we know strong federal investment can make a difference, as evidenced by the \$50 per student invested in STEM.

CSD is the first bipartisan initiative to support states and local school districts in offering the civic education necessary to equip youth in the United States with the civic knowledge, skills, and dispositions to become informed and engaged members of society.

This comprehensive piece of legislation would provide a \$1 billion annual investment in civic education at the local level, specifically in students, teachers, schools, and districts, as well as an investment in research and data and diversifying the teacher pool. Importantly, this investment is deficit-neutral as CSD contains fiscal offsets.

The bill's dramatic increase in support for civics and American history is a model of federalism. With 85 percent of funds directed to states to in turn be passed down to districts, all curricular decisions under CSD would remain matters of state and local control. In fact, as a rule of construction, CSD forbids the imposition of any federal curriculum or standards.

First introduced in 2020 in both the U.S. Senate and the House of Representatives by Senators Chris Coons (D-DE) and John Cornyn (R-TX) and Representatives Rosa DeLauro (D-CT), Tom Cole (R-OK), and Earl Blumenauer (D-OR), the Civics Secures Democracy Act now has 4 new cosponsors in the Senate—2 Republicans, 1 Democrat, and 1 Independent.


Recently reintroduced in the Senate with language that clarifies the role that the federal government would play in allocating funding and a "pay-for," we seek similar reintroduction in the House this summer and ask that you join Representatives DeLauro, Cole, and Blumenauer as original cosponsors of the attached, revised bill. Help pass the bipartisan, bicameral Civics Secures Democracy Act in the 117th Congress and make a generational investment in the strength and sustainability of our constitutional democracy.




